Note that as of this writing, the first three suppers are already spoken-for by groups, but later dates may still be available.

Soup suppers begin on Ash Wednesday (March 5) and continue every Wednesday through April 9. Thank you for your consideration.



Compassionate God, you have fed us with the bread of heaven. Sustain us in our Lenten pilgrimage: may our fasting be hunger for justice; our alms, a making of peace; and our prayer, the song of grateful hearts, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

Amen.

Throughout the season of Lent, this is a prayer that many congregations will lift up immediately following communion. It reiterates the three traditional foci of Lent: almsgiving, praying and fasting. And while fasting often gets the most attention ("What are you giving up for lent???"), this year I have a resource that can help to prioritize the other two.

But first, some background:

At the 2019 Churchwide Assembly, the ELCA approved a Social Statement condemning White Supremacy and Racist Rhetoric. The last point of that resolution was "We call all congregations of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America to engage in communal study of the structures and rhetoric that empower and fuel racism and white supremacy and to take to heart the teaching of Scriptures, so we may all be better equipped to speak boldly about the equal dignity of all persons in the eyes of God."

To support that work in congregations, the ELCA office of Racial Justice Ministries released a Lenten Devotional for 2025 entitled *Dismantle: An Anti-White Supremacy Lenten Devotional. From the introduction*,

On the following pages you will find thought-provoking, inviting, challenging and, most important, authentic reflections from 11 ELCA leaders...[who were each] invited to reflect on the lectionary text for their assigned Sunday or holy day and to recommend a resource — for example, a book, poem, song or movie — that they believe will help readers to utilize an anti-white supremacy lens in reading, understanding and/or relating to the biblical text. Each contributor also included a prayer (or invitation) after their reflection.

As a church committed to the work of racial equity and justice, this aligns with our desire to be an evermore welcoming community. While there are countless devotionals that have been prepared for lent over the years, I hope that the reflections, resources, and the prayers in this resource can be an opportunity through which each of us leans into Lent anew this year.


Easter Vigil Pick-Up Choir – A Second Invitation

Private Space Signs

You may have noticed around church that on some of the office doors, we now have signs indicating that they are "private space." The addition of these signs comes after a discussion at the February church council meeting. In light of new immigration policy that has opened churches to immigration raids through designating non-public space, we can have clarity as church leaders what access immigration officials have and do not have access to. This is in full alignment with a recent statement shared by Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton, when she wrote "As a sanctuary denomination, the ELCA proclaims walking with immigrants as a matter of faithfulness. The ELCA does not call for activity contrary to the law but for congregations, leaders and individuals to explore resources [in] their own contexts. Most of all, I encourage all to discern together how to live our faith, excluding none from God's overflowing love. God calls us to welcome the stranger and love the sojourner as we love ourselves."

I hope that as a congregation, we might continue to live out this call from God within and outside the walls of GA.

A Change to our Bulletins

Over the past couple of years, since returning to in-person worship, you may have noticed something exciting—our sanctuary is filling with more and more people on Sunday mornings! As a sign of hospitality, we have made every effort to include the full service—hymns, liturgy, and readings—in the bulletin to make worship as accessible as possible.

However, with the increasing number of bulletins printed each week, as well as their length, we have begun exceeding the limits of our copier lease. While the lease was appropriately sized for our needs when it was signed in 2021, our growing congregation now requires more printing than it can accommodate.

In an effort to be good stewards of our financial resources, starting this Sunday (tomorrow), our bulletin will include the Liturgy but will no longer print hymns that are available in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* (the cranberry hymnal) or the scripture readings, which can be found in the red Bibles.
